A very diverse group of faculty and students met to discuss the broad issue of how to understand and deepen political engagement in the United States around climate change. Participants discussed various examples of local-level mobilization around climaterelated issues and the reasons why national-level mobilization might be more difficult to sustain. There were suggestions of tactics that could be taken to raise popular awareness of the issues and several initiatives going forward were introduced.
